Council Meeting Summary November 13 & 14, 2024 Portland, OR and via Webinar

This is a summary of the Council's November 2024 public meeting and the actions the Council decided upon. November 13, 2024

Council Chair Jeff Allen brought the meeting to order at 8:00 a.m. Pacific Time. Council Members Ginny Burdick, KC Golden, Doug Grob, Mike Milburn, Louie Pitt Jr., Thomas L (Les) Purse and Ed Schriever were in attendance in Portland, OR. The next Council meeting is scheduled for December 10 & 11 via webinar.

Council Meeting Agenda Items

1. Council Work Session: Fish and Wildlife Amendment Preparation - Staff report on Program performance: Implementation assessment of Program habitat restoration and protection, wildlife, invasive species, predator management measures, related topics

Fish and Wildlife staff Kris Homel and Kate Self, Fish and Wildlife Division Director Patty O'Toole, and consultant Leslie Bach presented excerpts from the third categorical assessment focused on implementation of the Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife

Program's habitat measures. The habitat assessment covered the implementation of measures across five topic areas: habitat restoration, habitat protection, wildlife, nonnative and invasive species, and predator management. The presentation began with a review of the Council's approach toward assessing program performance and key concepts. For each topic area, Program strategies, measures, the status of implementation, and key points were described. Implementation was described using Strategy Performance Indicators and other data sources. The implementation examples presented under each topic characterized the range of actions implemented throughout the Columbia Basin over the last 40 years. The presentation concluded with a discussion of Program-scale observations from these examples. The Habitat Protection portion of the presentation was deferred to January to allow for more discussion on the other parts of the assessment. The habitat assessment, along with recent categorical assessments on the hydrosystem and artificial production, provided critical information to the Council and region on the implementation and performance of the Program in anticipation of the upcoming Program amendment process.

2. Update on Project #2010-077-00, Tucannon River Programmatic Habitat Project

Fish and Wildlife Division Project Review and Implementation Manager Mark Fritsch introduced Kris Buelow of the Snake River Salmon Recovery Board to provide an update and overview of the Tucannon River Programmatic Habitat Project that coordinates watershed restoration within the Tucannon Subbasin of Southeastern Washington. Buelow presented on habitat protection, restoration and enhancement for salmon and steelhead. This presentation was intended to provide a periodic update on the project's accomplishments and results as a part of the Council recommendation associated with the Anadromous Fish Habitat and Hatchery Review in April 2022. This was the last in a series of presentations on the umbrella habitat projects in the Fish and Wildlife Program. The Council members requested regular updates on these projects in their recommendations for the last project review cycle.

3. Discuss draft outline of letter calling for Fish and Wildlife Program amendment recommendations

Director O'Toole and General Counsel John Shurts presented details of the written request from the Council to state and federal fish and wildlife agencies, the region's Indian tribes, and the region as a whole for program amendment recommendations to the Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program. O'Toole and Shurts discussed the letter's outline, required elements, and ideas. If the Council continues its current schedule, the decision to formally send that letter will happen in January 2025. The members provided feedback to staff which will be incorporated in the draft letter that will be discussed at the December Council meeting.

4. Report on Bonneville Fiscal Year 2025 Start of Year Fish and Wildlife budget

Director O'Toole introduced Jason Sweet and Rodrigo George of Bonneville Power Administration to provide an update on the Fish and Wildlife Direct Program's expense and capital budgets for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025, along with past reported spending levels for FY 2024. The total Fish & Wildlife Program-level FY2025 start of year planning budget is set at \$327,502,577, which includes \$302,640,015 for expense, and \$24,862,562 for capital.

Manager of Power Planning Resources Kevin Smit introduced Jamae Hilliard Creecy, Bonnie Watson and Eric Mullendore with Bonneville Power Administration (BPA) to present an update on the Bonneville Energy Efficiency Action Plan. Details were presented on BPA's plans to continue to meet its energy conservation goal of 300 aMW from 2022 through 2027. BPA continues to track this progress and share accomplishments, success stories, and plans for the future.

Senior Power Analyst Tomás Morrissey presented a brief background on transmission and distribution (T&D) deferral and provided an outline to the draft T&D deferral methodology and next steps in finalizing this assumption for Power Plan analysis.

7. Report by the Independent Scientific Advisory Board on their review of the Fish and Wildlife Program

Independent Science Manager Erik Merrill introduced Tom Quinn, John Epifanio, and Stan Gregory with the Independent Scientific Advisory Board (ISAB) to present the 2024 Review of the Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program. In this review, the ISAB highlighted several valuable improvements made after the 2018 review that strengthened the scientific basis of the Program. The ISAB also identified several areas that could be strengthened and recommended approaches to track progress toward achieving the mitigation goals of the Program.

8. Transmission Landscape Update

Manager of Planning and Analysis John Ollis introduced members of the panel to discuss transmission planning on a national and regional level. Paul Wetherbee of Pacific Northwest National Laboratory presented on the National Transmission Planning study. Matthew Tisdale of Gridworks presented on the Connected West study. Jennifer Galaway of Portland General Electric provided an update on the Western Transmission Expansion Coalition, also known as WestTEC, which is embarking on a 20-year transmission study for the West. Kyle Kohne of Bonneville Power Administration provided an update on Bonneville's Evolving Grid efforts, including an overview of recently announced transmission projects identified through its most recent cluster study.

Regional Technical Forum (RTF) Manager Laura Thomas presented the proposed 2025 RTF budget while seeking approval from the Council for the 2025 RTF Work Plan.

Thomas discussed the RTF activities outlined in the charter, presented the many values the RTF brings to the region, shared a list of RTF funders, and outlined process for developing the scope for the next five-year funding agreement. Details of the proposed 2025 RTF budget were discussed, with Thomas seeking approval from the Council for the 2024 RFT Work Plan and budget of \$2,106,300.
