Dear Project Sponsor,

The Northwest Power and Conservation Council (Council) is initiating the 2026 Lands Project Review process. Pursuant to Section 4(h)(10)(D) of the Northwest Power Act, the Council and Independent Scientific Review Panel (ISRP) conduct reviews of projects directly funded by Bonneville under the Council's Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program (Program) that are implemented to mitigate, protect and enhance fish and wildlife affected by the hydropower system as called for under the Northwest Power Act.

There are currently 35 projects¹ funded through the Program that protect and restore habitat through land acquisitions. Of those, 29 will need to complete the review process. The 6 projects that provide administrative support to relevant projects will be considered contextually. (see below for project details).

As previously noted, staff have updated the review process for projects that have already completed an initial review(s). The projects in this Lands review have had their basic premise and scientific soundness accepted by the Council. This review will focus on project actions and accomplishments, with questions tailored to individual projects. Recommendations will include suggestions to improve project implementation. We will also use this review to better understand the implementation of Lands projects and collect valuable information related to our efforts to

track <u>Program performance</u>, and in particular, <u>details related to land acquisitions</u> (e.g., individual parcel polygon data, associated land management plans, number of acres, etc., if appropriate and available).

This Lands review was originally scheduled to begin in Fall 2024. Based on concerns expressed by fish and wildlife managers and further discussions with project sponsors, it was deferred to Fall 2025. This later launch date accommodated challenges associated with the timing of the current Program Amendment process overlapping with this review.

All general information contained in this email can also be found on the <u>Council's website</u> and will be updated periodically as the review process proceeds.

Review Materials - Due February 13, 2026

Each of the 29 projects slated for review will receive a set of individually tailored questions. Most projects will also receive an Excel table showing acquired parcels and associated information to confirm and/or correct our records. Project sponsors will be emailed Box links containing two files:

- 1. Questions to address in a Microsoft Word document form
- 2. Excel table to review the information we currently have on each project's parcels please confirm and/or correct information, or respond to parcel-specific questions.

Instructions

- Download and save these two documents to your computer, and work within each to address questions and confirm parcel information.

What happens after I submit my review materials? (Due date: February 13, 2026)

Council staff will review the information submitted, and among other things, identify any questions or other project information which the staff believes would be useful to have the Independent Scientific Review Panel (ISRP) consider. The Council staff will send these questions to the ISRP at the same time it makes the project information available to the ISRP. The ISRP will be free, of course, to provide comments and recommendations back to the Council on any aspect of the project information. However, the Council expects that, with regard to particular projects, the review and recommendations of the ISRP will focus on and respond to the questions asked by the staff.

Coordination meetings between project sponsor and Council staff and/or ISRP (March – June 2026)

In lieu of project presentations, coordination meetings between the project sponsor and Council staff and/or the ISRP may occur on an as needed basis. If the review materials submitted do not contain enough information or if issues need to be clarified to complete the review, Council staff will facilitate a meeting(s) with project sponsors to discuss remaining questions or issues.

ISRP recommendations report (June 26, 2026)

The ISRP report will include science-based comments and recommendations on reviewed projects and on Program-level issues.

Public Comment (June 26 - July 24, 2026)

The Council will make the ISRP's report available to the public and will accept public comments on the ISRP's report. The public comment period will open on June 26, 2026, and close on July 24, 2026.

Council Recommendations (August 2026)

The Council considers ISRP and public review comments in making final recommendations on projects to Bonneville and must explain in writing wherever the Council's recommendations differ from the ISRP's. The Council considers the impact of ocean conditions on fish and wildlife populations and determines whether the projects employ cost-effective measures to achieve program objectives. Section 4(h)(6)(C) of the Northwest Power Act requires the Council to adopt program measures that "utilize, where equally effective alternative means of achieving the same sound biological objective exist, the alternative with the minimum economic cost."

Recommendations will come in the form of specific project implementation recommendations and programmatic recommendations. Programmatic recommendations are issues that may apply to all projects or a subset of projects, depending on the nature of the issue (science, administrative, or policy). Once a Council recommendation is made, project templates will be posted on the Council website.
