SUBJECT: Discuss 2026 Fish and Wildlife Program next steps, implementation

BACKGROUND:

Presenter: Fish and Wildlife Division Staff

Summary: Following the adoption of an amended Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program in June, staff began working with the Council's Fish and Wildlife Committee in July to discuss next steps and implementation. Council members requested staff identify appropriate tools for each of the implementation tasks and to propose which of these tasks may be ready for near-term implementation.

Relevance: The 2026 Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife [Program](#) was adopted by the Council on June 16, 2026.

Background: The Council adopted its final 2026 Columbia River Basin Fish and Wildlife Program in June. A prepublication version is available on the Council's website pending completion and adoption of the Findings and Response to Recommendations, anticipated in late fall 2026.

Turning to the implementation of the 2026 Fish and Wildlife Program, first, a reminder that the Council does not implement much of the Program on its own. We rely on federal agencies such as Bonneville, the Corps, and the Bureau of

Reclamation implementing the Program through the standards of the Northwest Power Act. This requires working with many federal, tribal and state entities and others. We look for and create opportunities to bring the influence of the Fish and Wildlife Program into federal decision-making, also advancing policy discussions and supporting best available science.

From prior discussions regarding the Fish and Wildlife Division Work Plan, you will recall there are ongoing tasks the staff does on behalf of the Council and the Northwest Power Act. These include:

- Project Review and Recommendation (including follow-up and Step reviews, tracking project implementation and description of ongoing activities in Part Six of the 2026 Program)
- Assessing and reporting on Program Performance (including reporting on goals, objectives, indicators, and implementation, and description of activities in Part Seven of the 2026 Program)
- Coordination and collaboration with external entities (tracking and participating in various meetings, etc.) about the Fish and Wildlife Program, the Council and the Northwest Power Act.

To these basic responsibilities we add tasks associated with the implementation of the 2026 Fish and Wildlife Program. In July, staff reviewed a few fundamental elements for developing a work plan for Program implementation. First, we summarized the tasks included in the final Program decision, including directives noted at the time of decision, Program measures, and Program priorities for near-term implementation. Second, we reviewed the “tools” or ways the Council works to help get the Program implemented. Council members requested that staff identify potential tools that would be appropriate for making progress on the set of tasks, considering available resources, priorities, timeframes, etc.

For the September Committee Meeting, staff have 1) identified which tools are appropriate for which tasks and 2) suggested first and future steps for the tools, timing, and likely participants. Staff also proposed a set of tasks that are ripe for near-term implementation along with identifying implementation tools and steps for the remaining tasks. Any of those remaining tasks could be prioritized for near-term implementation based on discussion in September.

The objective for this committee meeting is to discuss whether this is the appropriate set of tasks for near-term implementation, review the tools we have identified for these and other tasks, and discuss the State of the Science review on summer hydro operations and concepts around Whole of Government as a tool for implementing tasks at various scales and scopes.

In identifying a set of tasks ready for near-term implementation, staff considered the following: specific language in the Program, the level of interest around the

topics, current status of implementation, whether a due date had been identified, and staff capacity and expertise across tasks (aiming to spread the work across multiple staff). The identified tasks are not more important than any of the others but represent a reasonable starting place. This is an ambitious discussion agenda for the September meeting, but we suggest getting as far as we can and continuing in October as necessary.

Attached to this memo are two documents for Fish and Wildlife Committee member consideration. Attachment A is a proposed list of tasks suggested for near-term implementation, along with associated tools, timelines, participants, and initial steps, originating from the Program decision and document itself. This attachment also includes information on the two discussion topics. Attachment B contains the remaining 20 tasks in the order they appear in the 2026 Fish and Wildlife Program, along with proposed implementation tools. As a reminder, the tasks in attachment B are no less important than those in A but reflect a proposed place to start.

2026 Fish and Wildlife Program tasks and tools

In July, we reviewed a menu of tasks from the 2026 Program and identified a set of tools at our disposal. For the September Committee Meeting, we have 1) identified which tools are appropriate for which tasks and 2) suggested first and future steps for the tools, timing, and likely participants. The Council intends to have regular coordination on these and other implementation tasks with the fish and wildlife managers through the RCF or other channels. Therefore, it is considered a blanket expectation and may not always be listed under individual tasks. Staff also identified a set of tasks that are ripe for near-term implementation (this attachment), along with identifying implementation tools and steps for the remaining tasks (Attachment B). Any of those remaining tasks could be prioritized for near-term implementation based on discussion in the September Committee Meeting.

The objective of this committee meeting is to discuss whether this is the appropriate set of tasks for near-term implementation, review the tools we have identified for these and other tasks, review timing and next steps, and discuss the State of the Science review on summer hydro operations and concepts around Whole of Government as a tool for implementing tasks at various scales and scopes.

In identifying a set of tasks ready for near-term implementation, staff considered the following: specific language in the Program, the level of interest around the topics, current status of implementation, whether a due date had been identified, and staff capacity and expertise across tasks (aiming to spread the work across multiple staff). The identified tasks are not more important than any of the others but represent a reasonable starting place.

- a. Bonneville should provide funding sufficient to implement the Program’s ongoing work, including adequate and dependable funding for the annual and long-term operation and maintenance of the direct Program’s assets.
 - i. **Part six- investments-** The Council expects a cooperative process [with BPA] that allows for improved communication and transparency regarding funding (e.g., start-of-year budget, placeholders, unspent funds, priorities) to track implementation of the Program. ... Bonneville shall provide timely notice to the Council when Bonneville implementation decisions result in a material change in the scope, desired outcomes or budget of a project. ...The Council will review this information and assess whether further recommendations are warranted, including further ISRP review.
 - ii. **Part Six- asset management-** The Council and Bonneville should continue to coordinate and support the Strategic Asset Management Plan (SAMP) and its implementation for the Program’s hatcheries, fish screens, and land acquisitions through a transparent and dependable annual process.

7. **Examine summer hydro operations**, taking into account and determining the relative importance of variables including but not limited to predation, water flow and temperatures, fish passage routes, stocks of anadromous and native fish, hatchery releases, biological benefits and power system impacts.

Whole of government as a tool

The Program includes onsite and offsite actions, and we expect them to continue to be funded as they already are. The Program also identifies additional actions that could be taken or recognizes that the work under the Program is part of the tapestry of mitigation, restoration, conservation, and enhancement actions in the basin. As such, there are funding or implementation responsibilities that are broader than the ratepayer responsibilities.

Whole of government is about applying funding and authorities to specific issues associated with particular scales...this means that for every issue, we have to define the appropriate “whole” of government.

Examples:

- Issue could be maintenance of hydro infrastructure (i.e., infrastructure important for fish passage). The scale could be all federal dams, and the “whole” could be federal agencies and Congress...
- Issue could be invasive zebra, quagga, or other species of invasive mussel. The scale is calling on BPA and other relevant federal agencies to continue to assist the state-led prevention efforts, call on federal agencies to conduct commercial vessel

inspections at federal projects, and in the case of establishment, calling on Bonneville and other federal agencies along with FERC-licensed utilities to support rapid region-response and monitoring.

Whole of government is also about recognizing that if other government entities in the Basin don't do their part to fully mitigate issues within their purview, it negatively impacts outcomes from the F&W Program.

This is a high priority for the Council. It is somewhat new and also somewhat ongoing, as we have worked with Congress in the past to increase funding for certain activities- like the Corps watercraft inspection stations.

8. Specific language from the Program on Whole of Government:

Message from the Council (pg 5)- Encourage a whole-of-government approach in which funding, research, and monitoring are coordinated amongst entities including Bonneville, the Army Corps of Engineers, the Bureau of Reclamation and others...

Part one: Legal and Social Context (pg 16)- The Council considers whole-of-government in this context to mean that 1) the Council expects substantial contributions from the federal agencies with responsibilities under the Power Act to protect, mitigate, and enhance fish and wildlife impacted by the hydropower system, and 2) the Council encourages additional substantial contributions from Congress and other federal agencies and non-federal entities to address impacts to Columbia River Basin fish and wildlife from sources other than hydropower. The Council commits to working with other government entities in the basin to seek authorizations and funding from Congress to the federal agencies to complement and help make more effective the efforts funded by the ratepayers.

Page 141- The Council expects all the relevant federal agencies to increase their efforts to help implement the Programs near-term priorities to the benefit of Columbia River salmon and steelhead and other fish and wildlife.... The Council agrees with and embraces the recent emphasis on a “whole of government” approach to salmon and steelhead protection, mitigation and improvement, recognizing the shared responsibility of all the levels of government for the impacts to and solutions for Columbia River salmon, steelhead and other native fish and wildlife.

Page 141: The Council is further interested in seeing that all the federal agencies - the Corps, the Bureau, NOAA, Fish and Wildlife Service, and the land management agencies – obtain appropriations and use their authorities to implement much of the

needed increase in habitat and predator management activities with non-ratepayer, non-reimbursed funds.

In identifying a set of tasks potentially ready for near-term implementation- Attachment A, staff considered the following: specific language in the Program, the level of interest around the topics, current status of implementation, whether a due date had been identified, and staff capacity and expertise across tasks (aiming to spread the work across multiple staff). The proposed tasks in Attachment A are not more important than any of the others (here in Attachment B) but represent a reasonable starting place. Any of the following remaining tasks could be prioritized for near-term implementation based on discussion in September.

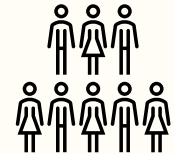
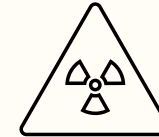
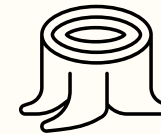


W.O.G. in context of Program

1) The Council expects substantial contributions from the federal agencies with responsibilities under the Power Act to protect, mitigate, and enhance fish and wildlife impacted by the hydropower system.
