COLUMBIA RIVER MANAGEMENT CO-MANAGEMENT AGREEMENTS

- ☐ <u>US v. Oregon</u>, lawsuit filed in US District Court in 1968
 - □ Defines treaty Indian fishing rights and state's management authority
 - □Ongoing case, Court oversees fisheries management
- Columbia River Fish Management Plan
 - ☐ In effect 1988-1999 to rebuild runs and share harvest
 - Negotiations in 5th year to finish new plan


Management Guidelines

- □ *U.S. v Oregon* 2005-2007 Interim Management Agreement in place.
- ☐ Includes harvest and production guidelines for stocks above Bonneville Dam.
- Chinook, sockeye, steelhead, coho and white sturgeon.

COLUMBIA RIVER MANAGEMENT ESA

- □ 13 listed species
 - □ 12 federal; 3 endangered and 9 threatened
 - □ 1 Oregon state; lower Columbia coho, endangered
 - □ Lower Columbia Coho will be the 14th listed species
- ☐ Mainstem Columbia River
 - □ Section 7 consultations
 - ☐ Federal nexus through <u>US v. Oregon</u>
 - ☐ Incidental take statements include fishery impact caps

COLUMBIA RIVER MANAGEMENT ESA

- □Biological assessments (BA's) developed by TAC.
 - □ Assessments of all impacts to listed fish
- ☐ Biological opinions (BO's) issued by National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS)

COLUMBIA RIVER COMPACT

- ☐ Compact and agreement between Oregon and Washington ratified by Congress 1918
 - ☐ Fishery decision-making authority
 - ☐ Provides concurrent jurisdiction of Columbia fisheries
 - □ Compact comprised of Directors or designees of WDFW and ODFW
 - Public hearings held to adopt or modify seasons and regulations
 - □ About 50 hearings held in 2004, and over 25 to date for 2005

U.S. v Oregon and TAC

- ☐ See Joint Staff report for definition and role
- ☐ Includes state, federal and treaty-tribe agencies
- Review fisheries, provide updates to runs
- ☐ Technical review of all data pertinent to management of fisheries
 - □ Authors ESA BA's
 - □ Detailed Joint Staff Reports 2-3 times per year
 - ☐ Fact sheets for each Compact- includes real-time data

Ocean/Inriver Coordination

□NOF

- □ Fishery-shaping of freshwater fisheries prior to ocean season setting.
- Need assurance that Columbia River fisheries are not precluded.
- Escapement goals and management objectives achieved.
 - ☐Includes Public.

In-Season Management

- □ Dam Counts
- ☐Fishery catches
- □ Escapement estimates
- □Coded-Wire Tags (CWT)
- **ESA** monitoring
- ☐ Activities almost daily




Figure 2. Map of the Columbia River Below McNary Dam Showing Areas Open to Commercial Fishing.




