
Review of Hook/Gear Studies

- ODFW Review in 2001
- Updated Assessment in 2008
 - -Barbed vs. Barbless Hooks

Trout Hooking Mortality Studies General Conclusions 2001 Review

- Individual fish mortality with bait is 5-10 times greater than flies and lures
- No difference between single and treble hooks
- No difference between barbed and barbless flies and lures
- No survival difference between trout played to varying levels of exhaustion

2001 and 2008 Staff Recommendation

- **■** Freedom of choice, barbless advisory
- Continue barbless in ocean salmon, consistent with PFMC, sturgeon
- Consider bait ban where reduced hooking mortality a management priority
- Improve angler education materials on proper handling of fish

Barbed vs. Barbless

Based on existing mortality studies, there is no biological basis for barbed hook restrictions in artificial fly and lure fisheries for resident trout."
